With 24 teachers teaching more than 50 English, French, and Computer classes every day, the classrooms in the Youth Center are being used constantly – as one class walks out the next class walks in. That's great for everyone but the teachers themselves. They're always sitting in the back of

another teacher's class to grade papers and walking in and out of the computer classes to print tests and handouts. The leadership of the Center decided that the teachers needed a work room, so they built it and this month Jason designed and welded desks and a printer stand to give the teachers a place to work.

Jitterbug:

Jason welded up this tool to push the little rock pieces down out of the top inch or so of cement when pouring a slab so that the floor doesn't chip as easily. People here hadn't heard of it, but a friend from the States suggested it. We're excited to try it out and see if it makes a big difference.

Bunk Beds:

Our teammates in the village of Mansoa are building a dorm to house the students that come to their three-month discipleship school. Right now they only have room for 8 to 12 students a semester, but after the dorm in completed they'll have room for 100. There's nowhere to buy bunk beds here, so Jason drew up some designs and started building one. The head and foot are done and look great. Once we get the design all worked out we could end up making as many as 50 for the dorm.

Volleyball:

Last year we brought over a volleyball net for the court, and this month Jason made poles for it. The court is already used for tennis, basketball, and soccer, but on Saturday afternoons the volleyball net goes up and Jason's been having a great time teaching lots of different people how to play.

Sandbox:

Since Bissau is the capital city, lots of missionaries who live out in the villages come into Bissau to rest, use the internet, buy groceries, and run all kinds of other errands. Many of those people have become our friends and it's a rare week that doesn't see different people eating with us. Many of the people who stay at the Guest House have kids and Savannah loves to share her toys with them. This month Jason spent a weekend adding a new super fun toy – a giant sandbox for Savannah and all of her little friends.

Elections in the US are crazy because of constant campaign ads and people polarized by the loud opinions of a minority of political extremists; but elections in Guinea-Bissau are crazy because of blatant corruption, violent protests, and rigged votes. On March 18 the people of Guinea-Bissau will elect a new President to replace President Sanha (elected in 2009) who got sick and passed away at the beginning of this year. Over the past 17 years, none of the presidents elected here have finished their five-year terms. All three of the guys before President Sanha were either kicked out by coups or assassinated.

giggles with glee There have already been demonstrations because the voter register hasn't been updated since the 2009 election. Protesters are claiming that up to 100,000 people have turned 18 since then and should be allowed to vote (there are only around 600,000 eligible voters on the register, so 100,000 is a big swing!) People are also upset with the government because the public school teachers nationwide are on their third strike of the year due to the fact that the government hasn't been paying them. If they strike much longer the entire school year might have to be cancelled.

In the middle of all of this we have been hearing some cool ways that God has been at work. The wife of the Prime Minister got saved several months ago and she has gotten really active in our church. Several other leaders in the government have been turning to the church in the past few months interested in things ranging from English classes to large joint projects.

Please pray for peace during the election process and that God would raise up leaders in the Jason + Bruly government who would seek and follow the Lord!
