During a recent visit to WAVS in Canchungo, we were able to do a little playing with their solar power system. Our shop equipment that had to be taken out there has been sitting for several months, safe from the rain, but unable to be used because their system makes different power than ours, and different than the machines need. Fortunately, with a little bit of work, their system was able to be reconfigured to make power that our equipment can use as well. The change will not be permanent, because it created some difficulty for some of their welders, but will at least give me access to our equipment while their school is on break the next couple of months. After that, the system will have to be switched back, but at least for now we have a window to do several projects that have been waiting for access to our equipment once again. We're grateful to have a few months to put these machines to use, and continue looking forward to the day when we're eventually able to reunite the whole shop under one roof with power that can run everything!

THE RAINY SEASON AND EBOLA IN WEST AFRICA

The rainy season in Guinea-Bissau (which begins in mid-May) brings a huge growth of green plants and a world washed clean; but it also brings standing water, breeding mosquitoes, sewage and trash polluting wells, and lots of sickness. This year has been no different with widespread flu and malaria; and many of the hospitals around the country are so full that patients have to bring their own mattresses and lay on them in corridors and hallways to receive medical treatment. Like many of our friends and neighbors we have also been really struggling to stay healthy. The whole country is looking forward to the end of the rain in October.

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I'm sure you've heard about the terrible outbreak of Ebola infecting so many people in the countries that border Guinea-Bissau. It's the worst ever recorded with over 1,300 people dead since March and fear, panic, and misinformation spreading like wildfire all over west Africa.

The saddest part of the outbreak is that it's not actually that difficult to stop an Ebola epidemic. Because the disease is only passed through direct contact (after the person gets really sick), if hospitals and medical workers have running water, reliable access to things like gloves and bleach, and a good way to get information out, it should be easily stopped. Unfortunately in west Africa those conditions are almost nonexistent.

Several different organizations have set up clinics all across Guinea, Liberia, and Sierra Leone and we're praying every day for the safety of all of the medical workers and the end of this outbreak.

Our dear friend and former teammate, Wade McHargue, came back to visit the discipleship training school he and his family started in the town of Mansoa while they were here with us several years ago. He was here for two weeks primarily to check on the school's progress, teach classes, and encourage the two Guinean families who are running the school. Our shop is now working on some more secure steel doors to replace the stolen wooden ones.

The McHargues are now ministering to the Lakota in South Dakota, in the Pine Ridge Reservation (the site of the Wounded Knee Massacre). Please pray for God's continued presence with Wade and his family as he returns to their ministry among the Lakota!
